Anna Fishzon, PhD, LP, FIPA, is the author of Fandom, Authenticity, and Opera: Mad Acts and Letter Scenes in Fin-de-Siècle Russia (*Palgrave*, 2013) and co-editor with Emma Lieber of The Queerness of Childhood: Essays from the Other Side of the Looking Glass (*Palgrave*, 2022). Her latest book is The Impossible Return: Psychoanalytic Reflections on Breast Cancer, Loss, and Mourning (forthcoming, Routledge, 2025). She has taught interdisciplinary courses at Williams College, Columbia University, and Duke University and authored scholarly articles on temporality, childhood, animation, Russian history, and opera. Dr. Fishzon is a member, supervisor, and faculty at the Institute for Psychoanalytic Training and Research (IPTAR) and at Pulsion: The International Institute of Psychoanalysis and Psychoanalytic Psychosomatics. She is also active in the Après-Coup Psychoanalytic Association. She is a psychoanalyst in private practice in New York City.
